


**The venue is the Motto Farm Motel Complex at Raymond Terrace

I would like to say I am very happy that our club has operated since its interception with such a happy harmonious and friendly manner.



We returned from Rome to Naples by train, arriving mid-afternoon and made our way by taxi to our Hotel with a room on the 28th floor overlooking the Bay of Naples. The view was outstanding.

Unbeknownst to us it was a public holiday and we couldn't understand why so many families with young children were out walking after 8.30 at night and carnival-type atmosphere prevailed everywhere we walked.

We tasted the best pizza in Naples - truly outstanding.

Next day we boarded a hydrofoil for the 6-hour journey to the Aeolian Islands on the west coast of Italy.


Our first stop was the Island of Lipari where we stayed for 2 nights. What a pretty place with quaint little houses, tiny narrow streets and colourful shopping.

We hired a taxi to take us around the island and the driver gave us a spectacular look at the largest island in the Aeolian Group.




This is a common form of transport around the Islands.

Tony was able to meet a distant cousin, Massimo De Luca, whilst visiting Lipari and also to look at the house that Tony's grandfather's uncle called home last century.



From Lipari we took a ferry across the water to the Island of Salina, where more of Tony's family came from and one cousin, Nuccio, still lives.

We visited with Nuccio and his wife Bettina on each of the two days spent on Salina. This is a much smaller island with just 600 people living in the main town Santa Marina and 300 people living in Lingua where Nuccio and Bettina live.



The streets in Santa Marina are not much wider than a couple of metres (some even less). Our Hotel was situated on one of these narrow "pathways". We noticed a construction site nearby and the picture below shows how they transport the building materials from the "drop off area" to the site.



Our hydrofoil from Salina over to Messina (Sicily) was an early start (too early for the hotel porters) so we let ourselves out of the hotel, dragged our very heavy bags down the hill, along the narrow pathway to the main street and down to the port for a 5.50am departure. Fortunately it had stopped raining during the night and we didn't have to juggle umbrellas as well.

We arrived in Messina at around 8.00am and were delighted to see the "Legend of the Seas" berthed along the waterfront.

Our hotel was also just a short walk away and we were happy to offload our heavy bags before heading off for a train journey to Taormina, about an hour or so train ride from Messina.


I had heard about Taormina but until you see it for yourself, you can't appreciate its stunning beauty. Set high in the hills above the coastline is this most fascinating medieval town, including a wonderful Greek Amphitheatre, which looks down on the coast below.



We spent a few hours wandering around the town, saying "we'll just go to the next corner and turn back" - but on reaching that corner, the view beyond was too good to miss, so on we walked, and walked, and walked.

Coming back to Messina, we opted to take the local bus instead of the train. This journey took 2 hours, however gave us a wonderful insight into the coastal towns back to Messina.

Next day was expected to be an interesting one, which it was. We took the train from Messina, across the straits to the mainland. The whole 8 carriages are loaded onto a ferry and taken across the water where they are offloaded and hooked up to a loco for the 6 hour journey to Rome. This photo (taken inside the ferry) shows the train carriages leaving the ferry for the mainland.



The train journey back to Rome took us through many long tunnels and mostly followed the west coast of Italy. Back through Naples arriving in Rome Termini Station at 9.15pm.

The taxi driver wanted 45 Euros to take us from the Station to our hotel near the Trevi Fountain. Tony told him to "get lost" and we walked, and walked, dragging our very heavy bags behind us, arriving at the tiny Hotel Trevi about an hour later.

We were hungry so after getting ourselves settled into our room, we set off for another look at the Trevi Fountain (and a bite to eat). To our surprise the place was jumping (don't think I mentioned it was Sunday night) and at 11pm there were hundreds of tourists and locals milling around the beautiful Fountain, taking photos, eating wonderful pizzas (which we had) and generally soaking up the aura that is Rome.



La Fontana De Trevi is amazing by daylight but it is something else at night - la bella donna!!!

Next morning we were surprised to see the Fountain empty, the coins being collected and then being scrubbed clean before a fresh fill of water for the next week's viewing by tourists from all around the World.

Well, with our holiday almost at an end, we were rather sad to say goodbye to Rome. What an amazing city to visit and what a wonderful time we had there.

Our flight out of Rome to Bangkok started with a camera installed on the nose of the plane - what a great sight to see the plane taxi out on your personal tv screen and then witness a take-off with a pilot's view - awesome.

Thai Airlines served great food and their friendly staff in beautiful Thai outfits were very helpful.
