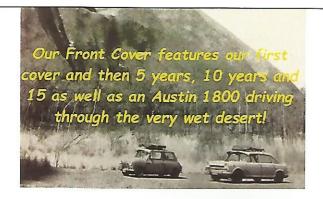

Dear members of BMCLAHG

20 Years of Heritage

"Smashed by steel fists, ripped asunder by armoured claws, the walls have come crashing down, reduced to desolate rubble. This place once hummed with life and hope, with ambition and commitment, with honest sweat and toil."

So said Wheels magazine (September 1999) in their Retro column. The Zetland plant was now levelled, except for the Tote building, and the one page article looked back at this British outpost of car making. A year earlier, on October 30th 1998, 83 former employees met for a nostalgic walk around the Victoria Park site and then lunch. This was just before the mechanical juggernauts moved in to start the destruction. At that lunch the BMC-Leyland Australia Heritage Group was formed.

From donations made at that meeting the first edition of the newsletter was produced in May 1999. With a cover featuring an architect's perspective of the plant, the newsletter detailed the aims of the group and included details of a directory of ex-employees. The table below reproduces the group's agenda.

Future activities were discussed with the Doncaster Hotel Reunion to remain unchanged, the possibility of the 25th Anniversary of the plants closing (Dec 1999) and the 50th Anniversary of the plants opening (March 2000) to be celebrated together in an event during 1999. Also on the agenda was exploring the possibility of securing sponsorship or a grant to publish a book encapsulating the plant's history. A list of state and regional contacts was also included with 8 listed for Sydney, 1 for NSW North Coast, 1 each for Victoria, South Australia, Queensland and 2 for Western Australia.

That's where it all started and here, 20 years later, are some of the achievements of that humble beginning.

- September 1999 an application was lodged to The Institution of Engineers Australia for the Zetland site to receive a Historic Engineering Marker (HEM). The November 1999 newsletter announced that the application was successful.
- The Group was incorporated on November 5th, 1999 with the 1st committee meeting on December 3rd.
- Triple celebration in 2000 for the 50th anniversary of the opening of the plant, 25th anniversary of the closing and the unveiling of the HEM bronze plaque. This plaque found its final home at Victoria Park on December 9, 2003.
- A grant was received from the Royal Australian Historical Society to record an oral history of employees of the plant.
- Successfully influencing the naming of new streets and parks at the Zetland site, which Landcom later recognized at a cocktail party (8/12/2005). The event recognized all the partners in the project and was held at the Zetland site.

- In April 2006 the Heritage Group assisted the City of Sydney Council with their Heritage Festival. The Council also expressed interest in accepting and preserving memorabilia as well as being interested in supporting the planned book on the plant and its employees.
- The BMC Car Club Trophy, first awarded as an encouragement by Tom Poole in 1959, was donated to the Association of British Car Clubs to be used as a perpetual award for Best Club display each year.
- The April 2013 newsletter received an issue number (49), better quality paper and full colour resulting in an improved quality to the included photos.
- The archive project has seen over 726 items scanned and collated and deposited with more to come.
- A new Web site appeared in 2014 (John Lindsay managed an earlier version)
- Reproduction of original factory newsletters as supplements to the Group's newsletter as well as reproducing the booklet 'BMC in Australia'
- Supply and sales of BMC/Leyland films including 'Horses to Horsepower' and 'The Car Makers'. Showing these movies has also added to the events calendar.

Then there are the books. In terms of time taken, the number of members involved, the planning and collating for the project 'Building Cars In Australia' stands out as a major success. Added to that publication, and just as important, is 'P76. The Inside Story', 'BMC-Leyland Australia Vehicle Reference Book' and 'Secrets of Style'.

However, of equal importance has been the ability of ex-employees to keep in touch at reunions, events and via the newsletter. Members continue to supply their stories for inclusion in the newsletters making them a valuable resource as well.

Sharing this wealth of knowledge with others who are interested in the products and how they were designed and manufactured has also ensured that the plant, its employees and their achievements will not be forgotten. Surely that is fulfilling the mission "to preserve the heritage of BMC-Leyland Australia".

Back in 1999 'Wheels' ended their article with mention of Roy South and the Heritage Group who "aims to keep the spark alive, the history straight and the wheels turning". When measured against this and the set aims of the group Barry Anderson can have the last word quoted from the July 2012 newsletter: "We have reason to be pleased with our achievements".

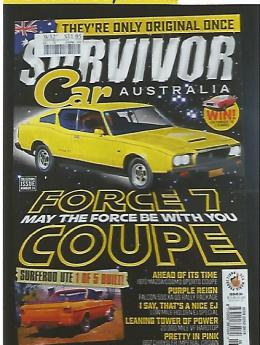

It was in 1965 that Evan Green found himself in Max Robert's office. Max Roberts was Castrol's assistant General Manager and he had a question for Evan which had come from Castrol's London office. Could two cars travel between

motoring feat of 1966 was performed by a quartet in two BM.C. cars—an Austin 1800 and a Morris Mini Da Luce.



10,000 and 15, 000 miles up and down the Birdsville track?

Behind the question was the need to 'heat' test a new Castrol oil and between them they decided that it was not really possible. However, on studying a map of Australia Evan suggested that for that mileage two cars could visit all the mainland states. Castrol wanted extreme conditions, lots of sand, heat and dust. So a plan was hatched, the backdrop: Australian desert in Summer, two cars: an Austin 1800 and a Morris Mini Deluxe courtesy of BMC; a crew of 4: Evan, renowned driver 'Gelignite' Jack Murray, photographer Scott Polkinghorne and BMC engineer Alan Kemp. Crossroads Alice was born.

Only men with experience of the Australian desert could possibly have undertaken this test it was their skill and determination that forced the cars through conditions that would have strained even a tracked vehicle to the limit.

Fast forward to 2018, on a Saturday afternoon in June, 40 ex BMC/Leyland employees and enthusiasts gathered to revisit this feat of man and machine. Castrol had been contacted and was only too willing to be a part of the afternoon with John Wilmington attending as their representative.



Castrol also supplied caps and a stubby holder for each attendee.

Some had seen the video record of the trip before and some had not. All were amazed at what was asked of the cars, the oil and the drivers. Seeing snow and ice being removed from the sump of a Mini and then days later it is in the heat of the desert, then sliding in desert mud, crossing rivers and being manhandled off the side of the road was truly inspirational. Scenes of the team driving past Uluru (then only referred to as Ayer's Rock) while water from storms cascades over what should be desert.



Crossroads Alice is a glimpse of the past and how things were done which represents an important piece of motoring history. Like many other stories, this needs to be preserved for future generations.

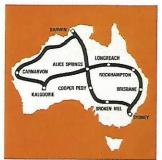


The oil was launched in July 1966 in a venue in Chatswood where 'Crossroads Alice' was screened. Evan Green and

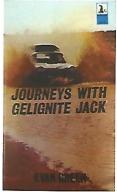
attended as did Roger Foy. Each attendee was given a tin of the new oil and here is Roger with his tin!





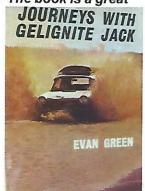
The course the crew and the car

Tony Burnett, Castrol's Historian, supplied us with some additional information and advertising. He was also able to tell me that Castrol XL features an 'oil-soluble long chain tertiary alkyl primary amine tungstate', hence 'Liquid Tungsten'. He also pointed out that on our advertising for our event the oil was listed as GTX. GTX wasn't released until 1968 in the UK and 1970 in Aus. I got the information straight off the DVD jacket! Evan Green also recorded the experience in a book, Journeys with Gelignite Jack. Below are the covers from the hardback (right) and the paperback (left). Note that the hardback cover has the picture printed back to front making it a left hand drive 1800! Tony also informed me the dent you can see on the bonnet was caused by a big roo. The book is a great



read and records a lot more of the difficulties encountered.

'the 1800 was immobilizedone front wheel was firmly on the road, another was embedded in the soft bank, and both rear wheels were high in the air. Jack was wearing a smile of triumph..."I found the road" he announced

The Austin 1800, picked randomly from the production line, was filled with the new oil and then driven to Brisbane and back to run it in. The engine was then stripped and meticulously measured, details recorded, and plastic replicas made of two cylinders.

The drivers were tasked with keeping the vehicles at the highest possible cruising speed. Oil samples were taken along the way and a detailed log kept.

At the end of the trip, with 13,447 miles on the clock, the engine was stripped down and pre and post measurements compared. There was measurably less engine wear than expected!
