

## AGM 2007 Wairarapa Weekend

As I mentioned, we now have an itinerary for the weekend. This follows.

Friday 23 March. We meet and greet members as they arrive. The Club will have a BBQ ready for those who need dinner and can't be bothered going further afield. You arrive at:

Ph 06 377 4144 and make your booking NOW and tell them you're with the Leyland Club.

The Motel is on the southern side of town just south of the Kurupuni roundabout on the right if travelling south.

Saturday 24 March. 8.00 a.m. Buffet Breakfast supplied by the motel and paid for by the Central Group. If you are staying elsewhere, just turning up this morning or local and want to partake of this breakfast you must let me know. All are welcome. Contact Rob Jones with numbers.

8.50 a.m. After breakfast we visit Magoo's Street Rods, less than 5 minutes away. Here we will see some of what will become New Zealand's leading street rods under construction. This is way beyond a panel and paint shop as we know it. There is also an interesting gift/novelty/model shop in the reception area. We are expected at 9.00 a.m. Follow Rob to avoid the worst traffic.

Proprietor Lloyd Wilson assures me that the women will enjoy the visit as much as the men, going on past group visits, however, if some of you would like to experience the shopping in Masterton you are welcome to do so. This can be arranged the night before.

10.20 a.m. By 10.30 a.m. we should be assembled on Te Ore Ore road on the northern side of town off the main road by the Mobil station. This is your last opportunity to fill up your tank...but you will have done that already won't you! We are going on a country amble to Pongaroa where we will lunch at the Pongaroa Café. We should arrive about 12.30 p.m. for lunch. Our hostess Tam is expecting us and will have staff and food aplenty. Simple fare in a very small town.

We will travel down a very scenic route, which is sealed all the way (I've driven it). It does appear remote at times so we have developed a simple photo/question sheet for you to identify/answer along the way so you know you're not lost. This is non-competitive, just informative but should be a bit of fun too. It will be handed out on the day.

After lunch...1.30 to 2.00 p.m. we head out of Pongaroa on the Pahiatua Road. This is the left turn immediately beyond the Café. Having travelled across country to SH2 via the Makuri Gorge we arrive at SH2 just north of Pahiatua. TURN LEFT at the T.

About 25 minutes later we will arrive at the Middleton Model Railway and Cwmglyn and Farmhouse Cheeses, our next place of interest. Here you can experience a rail extravaganza showing off all sorts of layouts; even several you can run yourself. This place is a gem, and we will have afternoon tea and some cheese and crackers allowing sampling of the tasty cheeses on offer. There is also some local craft works for sale, along with train layout necessities.

Colin will tell you about the trains and Biddy will tell you about the cheeses and the cows.

For those of you who are more into birds the Mount Bruce Bird sanctuary is about 2 Ks up the road and you could visit there if you wish.

From Middleton we return to Masterton to the motel. This will allow time for freshening up, refreshing and preparing for the AGM.

Due to circumstances beyond my control we are not able to enjoy a dinner dance as originally proposed, and we are meeting and dining at a different venue also.

The 2007 Wairarapa AGM will be held at the Wairarapa Services and Citizens Club, 20 Essex Street, Masterton. This is not too far from the motel and we intend to have transport laid on for the evening.

We will meet in the private dining room that has a large outside courtyard attached to it. After the meeting the room will be returned to the dining configuration. If the weather is kind we can be inside or out. Dinner will be from the Spitfire Grill that comes well recommended to us.

So the plan is AGM at 5.00 p.m. pre dinner drinks afterwards with dinner at 7.30 p.m.

Sunday 26 March. Breakfast your care. To allow for packing etc we will have a later start, 9.30 a.m. when we will depart south for Carterton. Turn left out of the motel and go round the round about and then head south...it's easier believe me! We are heading for a big green shed just north of Carterton and the Taratahi Hotel. This shed will be known as Gasoline Heaven, a new automotive venture only opening this weekend. You never know we may get in the papers!

I haven't been there yet as it is still being assembled so we may be almost the first Club to visit.

## Wheels with Attitude

At our January BBQ meeting Paul, Bryan, Bruce, Merv and the Jones family all agreed to go to the show and the plan was to meet at 88 and convoy on up with 6 vehicles. Well it almost worked.

Bryan, in his XJ6 came over on Saturday evening and stayed the night as he had the longest journey; Paul and Linda arrived in the P76 and then Bruce Cooper in his BMW. As Merv was having P problems he agreed to meet us there in his Ford Transit motor home. Brian and Colleen Francis also joined us in their P76. Merv had fashioned a sign for the front of the Transit proclaiming it to be the "Leyland Club Head Office and Dining Car" He doesn't know what he's let himself in for!

These events provide many opportunities to help other P people. Paul and Bruce had removed a petrol tank from an old Executive (we must get rid of one day) and loaded a new starter motor from stock for delivery to Merv and member Ian Hunter. Merv had a hole appear in his fuel tank so his P wasn't in attendance. Ian came along to catch up with us all, look over the show and collect his new starter motor. While there we ran into two previous members, Bert Empson with his S3 XJ6 and Peter Tapp in his amazing Triumph TR5 and sourced some new parts for our stocks from elsewhere. Once all the business was put aside it was time to talk vehicles, as there was more than just cars on display.

Carefully set up behind some sort of pit in the ground and a display of Peugeot's we see Merv and Rose's motor home. To the left we have Paul's V8 super, Bryan's 3.4 XJ6 and Bruce's BMW 728. To the right we have Brian and Colleen's V8 Super and our Deluxe 6. Later, we were joined by an old mate of mine in his Morris 8 Series E, so you see we did have a cosmopolitan display!




As usual the P76's attracted a lot of attention, especially having the V8 and 6 in a row. One bloke even thought that Brian's car was modified and that 6's were the norm. We sorted that.

Sonya and I put Abby in her 4WD pram and proceeded to check out the exhibits. I didn't know I knew so many people. Our progress was painfully slow and I didn't get to see 40% of the vehicles but I still had a ball. There were cars, trucks, tractors, motor cycles and other wheeled items from around the globe.

Some of the "cars" follow. You would have to go a long way to get a vehicle with more attitude than this. Despite what it looks like it ran most of the day, smoothly and with little attention. The owner just left it running...I don't think anyone would have stolen it and that's not water gushing out of the radiator.

This is a mower developed from a 1921 Buick 6 with exposed push rods and tappets, something that amused many people. With an altered chassis, a radiator off a crane truck embossed "The 4WD Auto Co Clintonville Wisconsin" a Model T diff and a Ruxton gearbox, mismatched wheels and heaps of attitude it is thought the vehicle was built in Hastings. Believe it or not, I didn't notice it in Dannevirke but I saw it again at the Harvest festival and it was carrying some special type of registration with a new plate! A mower Rego perhaps.



Dear 7.)

Well we are underway with the planning for the 2008 P76 Nationals to be held in Victoria at Easter in 2008, over the long weekend starting on Good Friday 21 March 2008 and finishing on Monday 24 March 2008. We are putting together what we think will be an interesting program of events of which we will forward more information as we get closer and the details are finalized.

This letter is to advise you of one of the most important issues – the accommodation. Our committee has decided that the 2008 Nationals will be staged in Geelong, the 2<sup>rd</sup> largest city outside of Melbourne, Geelong is about a 90-minute drive from Melbourne, and one of the oidest cities in Victoria. It is a major port, the home of Ford manufacturing, and has some interesting tourist centres. It is not far from the Great Ocean Road or from Ballarat – both major pourist attractions.

One of the objectives set by our committee is to maximize the exposure of our great car to the general public. We have been doing this within our club with great results – our membership is increasing and the standard of our cars is steadily improving. We want to continue this process of public exposure at our National get together. So Geelong makes a good choice we believe. Get your cars into working order, give them a clean and polish and help us, your committee, to host a great P76 National event at Easter in 2008 – all the interstate clubs, and the New Zealand club have been invited and should attend in great numbers.

Our club has made a booking for a number of cabins in a campground in Geelong called the "Riverglen Holiday Park". It is a good quality campground on the outskirts of Geelong, and close to shops and other accommodation should members wish to stay elsewhere. The cost for one of the cabins we have booked is \$90 per night with a minimum of 4 nights over the Easter period—this can be the Thursday to the Sunday nights; or Friday through Monday nights. This price is consistent with most campgrounds in Victoria over the Easter period as is the 4-day minimum booking. These are luxury

cabins and will sleep six. The \$90 is for two people, with extras costing \$10 each per night

We will need to finalise and confirm the bookings as early as possible as accommodation is at a premium over Easter. We also have to pay a deposit when confirming. We have attached an accommodation booking form for all P76 members to complete and return as soon as possible—<u>np later than 25 March 2017</u> if they want to take advantage of the accommodation we have organized. Should you wish to arrange your own accommodation that is fine, but we do suggest you get in quickly, no matter where you want to stay. If you want to stay in the Riverglen, but want to camp—again let us know want to stay. If you want to stay in the Riverglen, but want to emp—again let us know want to the bookings we have made. A \$50 deposit will also be required for as we can add it to the bookings we have made. A \$50 per day again with a minimum of these campgrounds. Cost of a powered campsite is \$29 per day again with a minimum of 4 days. We need to confirm our arrangements at Kiverglen by no later than Easter this year, so we would require anyone who wants to stay at the Riverglen to send us a \$50 deposit before then—<u>no later than 25 March 2007</u>.

One of the benefits of all staying at the one venue will be that the P76 talking and comparing cars can go on till late over a few beers without worrying about Booze Buses!! Riverglen will be the Nationals Hendquarters, and all of our committee will be staying there. There are large parks opposite the campground with some good children's play equipment. We want to encourage family participation, and there is plenty for the family to do in Geelong.

As we finalise events and things such as club souvenirs and the final dinner etc., we will let you know what the final costs for the 2008 nationals will be. We will keep them to a minimum, and make most things and costs optional.

We are looking forward to making this a great event for all our club members, and members of all the interstate clubs. We have invited all interstate members to stay at the same campground so it should be a great gathering of P76's.


