
Karamea is one of those places one must visit in ones lifetime. Another tick on the map.

Then everyone set off to Greymouth for a look around the town before heading out to the Recreation hotel for lunch. After a long lunch stop we headed north to visit Waiutu Village in miniature, and Reefton in an even smaller scale. It got very hot there and the ice-cream counter was rushed by most of the group. We pushed the car back and put it in first gear, started the car and headed for Picton. The President, Rob Jones, welcomed those present to the meeting and especially those who had travelled great distances.

APOLOGIES:

Andrew and Debbie Larsen, Merv Cox and Rose Bendall, Ron Butler, Mike and Annette King, Don and Elva Sullivan, Jenifer Alexander, Sonya Jones (present in Reefton, absent from the meeting).

It was resolved that those apologies be accepted; A Clifton-Mogg / F Biddick.

MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING:

The President stated that the

minutes had been circulated and requested any errors or ommissions. There being none, it was resolved that the minutes be confirmed. A Clifton-Mogg / D Alexander.

MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES:

PUBLICITY OFFICER:

Edward Tubman was re-appointed.

P Meyer congratulated the Editor on the effort he had put into the magazine for the last twelve months particularly and expressed the appreciation of the membership for the regular production of Penzed. The meeting affirmed with acclamation.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

- 1. The question was raised of the need to show a cumulative balance in the Financial Report along with the suggestion that there be a return to regions as a refund. R Jones replied that yes, grants could be re-instituted, but other factors also need consideration: it is our 25th year and some expenditure may be generated through this avenue. 
