Outline on accommodation, attractions and venues.

Motels

Mount View Motel Ph 06 278 4091 This is your current option. Once this is full you will need to contact Lance (see below) or have the motel locate a nearby unit for you

Anyone missing out on accommodation, we will attempt to find some for you as there are at least another four or five motels in the town. Miss out on those then bring a sleeping bag as you could end up in the back seat of one of my cars in the storage shed! (After you have filled your own cars of course). No heating or power there though.

The Hawera Club

This is located in High Street Hawera opposite the Ford dealer. Entry and parking is at the rear of the building. Next door is a large council car park (free).

If you are behind the Ford Dealer you are at the South Taranaki Club (Workingman's) and on your own, or at least with the others that have made the same mistake.

The Hawera Club is located in an old building built in 1901 by the club, then known as the "Hawera Gentlemen's Club". Women have been allowed in however since 1985 so don't be shy. The members of this club are a very welcoming bunch so just stroll on in.

Friday is members and guests dinner night so we will be sharing with them (keeps the cost down). The rest of the time we have it fairly well to ourselves.

Southgate (EX Dairylands)

Fun-Ho Museum Inglewood

Tour will take about one hour including a demonstration of how the toys are made (not a live demo). Ed: Of particular interest to some members, a great place for all Kiwis'.

White Cliffs Brewery

Do tours and tastings, again about an hour. A beer garden and Shop on site. (Drivers restraint please)

Waiau Estate Winery, Onaero

Can be a two course (starter and main or main and dessert) or finger food aperitif (4 to choose from) hence the two prices. This will have to be decided.

Waitara Railway Preservation Society Inc.

Restoration centre for our old rail transport and a return trip to Lepperton on the old disused NZ Rail line takes about an hour. Tea and cream scones afterwards for extra but given what we have eaten and drunk so far I don't think we will need that. But maybe just one.

Ross Calgher Engineering

View the only genuine Benson & Hedges series racing P76 left in NZ. I'm sure if Ross is off racing his Viper or SD1 he will leave us the keys?

Colin Johnston Private Museum

Model Cars, Antiques, over 80 wind up gramophones with a collection of 78 speed and Cylinder records, old Waitara fire engine and other exhibits. Ed: *I have been here before, it is superb*.

Roy King International Restorations

Roy carries out all sorts of rebuild work partial and otherwise for clients all around the world. Attention to detail and make what you can't find or get attitude just has to be seen to be believed.

Tawhiti Museum

This privately owned museum is a must. The models and recreations of the history of the area along with a huge Tractor museum are world class. The Ogle's have tourists from around the world come here just to see this Museum set up in the old Tawhiti dairy factory. Nigel is working on another huge secret wing (Whalers and Traders) which hopefully will be open by the time our AGM takes place. Ed: As notified this new wing is now open.

Mr Badgers Café

Located as part of the Tawhiti Museum complex.

... And to spite the ex-wife, they even took the curtain rods!


The Bits Missed Tour by Rosalie Maunder



The road drops about 10metres to a complex right hand corner, which accounts for a great deal of drama through the day. The comparison with the early sunrise in the Sahara Desert in the famous Evan Green book is obvious. The opening of the new Hampton Downs Motor Racing Circuit

on Saturday 14th November 2009 at Meremere. next door to the Drag Strip is where the P76 made its mark. If you need to ask where this is, you can stop reading now. A selection of drivers was brought together, with little regard to skill, ability or vehicle, to participate in "the first official laps at Speed around Hampton Downs 2.8km International Circuit". P38X2 with its current owner was lucky enough to be included. The field was divided into Groups: Group 1 "Road Car Saloons", Group 2 "Race Cars", Group 3 "Open Wheelers". There was about 25 entrants, total and the day was one of friendliness and happiness to be a part of the those who will forever be holders of the original lap time records. Group 1, like Group 2 was dominated by Porsches, but with some other interesting marques

included. Group 3 consisted of 2 vehicles


So to return to the 1st corner, which leads to a short straight at the end of which is a 90deg right turn, immediately followed by a climb, maybe 10metres, to the apex of a left corner of about 120deg, where the track falls again to a very short straight, a sweeping 180deg right hander, a climb of about 12metres, a prompt fall to a left hander followed by a sharp left (this could be described as a complex corner!!), a longer flat straight to a sweeping right hander, totaling 180deg, climbing around 30 metres to either pit lane to the right or straight (over the bump!) to Pit Straight, 4350 r.p.m, the Starting Grid, the Starting Line and then according to the size of the manly bits, where you put your foot on the middle pedal for the start of Turn 1. Obviously the contours have a major influence on this Circuit, testing both driver and vehicle, at the same time providing great spectator entertainment and a serious challenge to driver ability. Awesome. AWESOME.


