

Legends of Speed 25 & 26 January 2025 Hampton Downes

Celebrating David Oxton

Saturday the 25th of January dawned fine and turned into a really hot day, especially on the concrete and black asphalt of the Hampton Downs motor racing circuit. The "Coke" P76 of Mike King, a tribute to the 1975 B&H 1000km entry of David Oxton / Garry Pedersen, and the actual Ross Calgher / Malcolm Andrews car from the same race, arrived on time along with four road cars: Rob Jones driving Ed Tubman's Omega Navy car, Ed in Alex's Bold As Brass, Steve Learmonth in his beautiful and tastefully-modified burgundy Hotrod and Gordon Gruebner in his Bold As Brass. The Coca-Cola car was driven off the trailer and staged outside the front of the marquee which was housing some actual and representative race vehicles from throughout Oxton's motorsport career. Andrew Larsen's Spanish Olive ex-Calgher car was wheeled off the trailer and, along with the four road cars, parked appropriately in a prime spot - adjacent to the main lane and the marquee.







This was all managed among the comings and goings of race cars, being a busy and full race weekend. Up went the tent and club flags then everyone settled in for a weekend of P76 goodness. At this stage I should mention that Andrew put in a supreme effort to have his car looking as it raced, 50 years ago, and to get it to HD from Taranaki to support this event and the club. Photos - Mikes Coca Cola P76 with a Ralt RT4, the Larsen/Calgher P76, the club display and sharing our space, Racing Ray Williams and his awesome sounding Capri.

During the course of the meeting, our club and cars were repeatedly mentioned over the public address system. There were many people, throughout the weekend, wandering through the cars, looking and chatting with club members. At lunchtime on Saturday there was a "parade" of Oxton-related cars lapping the circuit - Garry Pedersen took the wheel of the big Leyland and, despite being 82 and having never driven around Hampton Downs, put in some hot laps with Mike in the passenger seat and Alan (Mr Coke) Boyle in the back with his wife. Garry even put a passing manoeuvre on the Peter Brock / Oxton Commodore - yeah!! Mike was pretty impressed.

We tried to get all six drivers from that 1975 race to Hampton, the third pairing being Dauntsey Teagle / Jim Murdoch, four fronted: Oxton / Pedersen (still good mates after all these decades), Ross Calgher turned up for a look and Jim Murdoch was there. Malcolm

Andrews was aware but was a no-show. Dauntsey was "in my last throes" (his words) in a hospice on Auckland's North Shore and despite arrangements in place should he have been up to a half day outing; it wasn't to be - he passed away about a week later. Rest In Peace, Dauntsey, Dauntsey was a Club member from 1994 until 2004.

Saturday evening's onsite function was a great event, with many national and international motorsport luminaries celebrating David's career. Two vehicles were allowed into the pavilion for the occasion: the black Oxton Begg FM5 Formula 5000 car with which David won the 1972/1973 and 1973/1974 NZ Gold Star championships (making it three in a row) and the mighty Coca-Cola P76. And the Leyland was closer to the people, who were all seated at tables of about eight - you couldn't see the F5000 parked on the other side of it! Legend has it that the big car only just fitted through the pavilion doors. During the evening one of the many funny anecdotes was Oxton quoting one of Dauntsey's motorsport lines: "Coming second is like kissing your sister!".





Sunday had its bouts of rather inclement weather, but the meeting largely pressed on.

See the foggy P76 above. All in all, a highly successful outing for Team P76 - as predicted, we were a star attraction and thanks go to all involved for their organisation and attendance. Thanks to the club for funding the graphics application on the Coke car (no thanks to Coke/Coca-Cola themselves) and to Lisa Adlington (Add Design and Print, Waihi) who did us a very good deal and managed to get her materials supplier to donate the vinyl. 





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
